



Parallel Structure

Parallelism, or **parallel structure**, refers to the repetition of similar grammatical patterns within a sentence. Nouns must match with nouns, verbs with verbs, adjectives with adjectives, and so on. Balancing the grammatical structures in clauses, phrases, or elements in a list improves the flow of your writing, making your sentences clearer and easier for the reader to understand.

Here's an example of a sentence that is **not** parallel:

Patricia enjoys reading, to go swimming, and she plays soccer.

Oftentimes, you can tell if a sentence contains parallel structure by breaking it into several smaller sentences and examining whether or not these new sentences follow the same grammatical pattern:

Patricia enjoys reading.

Patricia enjoys to go swimming.

Patricia enjoys she plays soccer.

In order for this sentence to be parallel, each of the verbs should follow the same -ing (or gerund) format:

Patricia enjoys reading, swimming, and playing soccer.

Consider the following examples of non-parallel and parallel sentences. Which sentences do you think flow better?

Not Parallel: Sean's mother told him to clean his room, the laundry needed to be folded, and to feed the cat. **Parallel**: Sean's mother told him to <u>clean</u> his room, <u>fold</u> the laundry, and <u>feed</u> the cat.

Not Parallel: The new café downtown has delicious food, great music, and the coffee is always fresh. **Parallel:** The new café downtown has <u>delicious</u> food, <u>great</u> music, and <u>fresh</u> coffee.

Not Parallel: Do you prefer to exercise at the gym or jogging outside? **Parallel:** Do you prefer to exercise at the gym or to jog outside?

Not Parallel: Every morning, Sandeep eats eggs and toast, goes for a run, and reading the newspaper. **Parallel**: Every morning, Sandeep <u>eats</u> eggs and toast, <u>goes</u> for a run, and <u>reads</u> the newspaper.

Not Parallel: Céline thought that she would have time to grab a quick lunch, catch a movie at the multiplex, and household chores would be finished before her doctor's appointment at 4:30pm. **Parallel:** Céline thought that she would have time <u>to grab</u> a quick lunch, <u>to catch</u> a movie at the multiplex, and <u>to finish</u> household chores before her doctor's appointment at 4:30pm.

Not Parallel: They were unsure whether they wanted to go surfing in Hawaii, parasailing in Florida, or scuba dive off the coast of California.

Parallel: They were unsure whether they wanted to go surf<u>ing</u> in Hawaii, parasail<u>ing</u> in Florida, or scuba diving off the coast of California.





Not Parallel: Omar's advisor told him he had two options: rewrite the third chapter of his thesis or scrapping the whole section altogether.

Parallel: Omar's advisor told him he had two options: <u>rewrite</u> the third chapter of his thesis or <u>scrap</u> the whole section altogether.

Not Parallel: He was depressed, irritable, and wanted to sleep. **Parallel**: He was <u>depressed</u>, <u>irritable</u>, and <u>tired</u>.

Not Parallel: In art class, Min made a watercolor painting, a paper doll, and sculpted a mug out of clay. **Parallel**: In art class, Min made a <u>watercolor painting</u>, a <u>paper doll</u>, and a <u>clay mug</u>.
