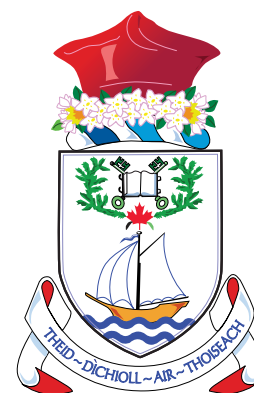

Honorary Degree Recipient

Mr. John Gracie

Cape Breton University is delighted to honour and recognize an acclaimed singer-songwriter who promotes the spirit and culture of Cape Breton and Nova Scotia through his music, Mr. John Gracie.

John Gracie is a multiple award-winning singer-songwriter and JUNO nominee, born and raised on North Street in Glace Bay, just a stone's throw from the Atlantic Ocean. Deeply shaped by Cape Breton's rugged coastline and cultural richness, his music reflects the spirit of the sea, the coal mines and the people of Cape Breton and Nova Scotia. As the son of a coal miner, John's early songs paid tribute to the working-class heroes of his hometown.

One of his most personal songs, *Seabird's Cry*, was inspired by time spent with his father at the Glace Bay wharf, watching the seagulls and talking about life, simple moments that quietly shaped his path and his perspective. His mother, hearing her five-year-old singing behind the coal stove, recognized his talent and put money away weekly so he could attend vocal lessons.

After university, John began performing across Cape Breton, including unforgettable nights at Cape Breton University, then known as UCCB. He fondly recalls nights at the campus pub where the music, laughter and energy of the crowd cemented his love for performing and connecting with people through song.

His talent soon took him across the globe, appearing on national television and proudly sharing the music and stories of his home region with international audiences. He has released 15 albums in genres including Folk, Americana, Country and Swing Jazz, along with best-selling Christmas projects.

John has long used his music as a force for good, writing songs to support food banks, promote social justice and honour frontline heroes. He was commissioned to write *I'll Be Your Voice*, a moving tribute to nurses and healthcare workers, which resonated deeply during the pandemic.

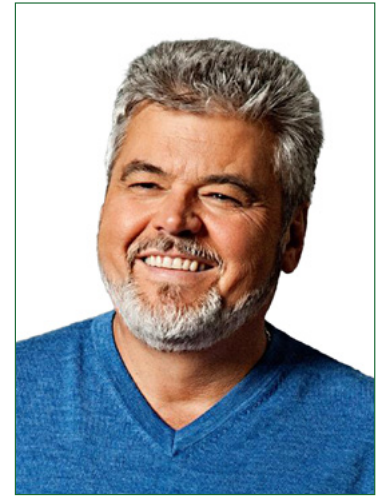
His powerful ballad *Kiss Me* brings attention to the often-overlooked reality of homelessness, shining a compassionate light on the struggles faced by those living on the streets. The song highlights how mental illness and addiction are at the heart of this crisis, urging listeners to look beyond stereotypes and see the human beings behind the hardship.

His highly reviewed album, *A Gene MacLellan Tribute*, also reflects his deep respect for Canadian songwriters.

One of John's most beloved songs, *Cape Breton Christmas Morn*, sparked a beautiful tradition at Wentworth Park, where he launched an annual Christmas concert that continued for over a decade. His goal was always simple: to help families of Industrial Cape Breton create new memories in the same place where generations before them had gathered.

Now living in Dartmouth, John remains deeply connected to Cape Breton. He is married to Andree Morrison Gracie and is a proud father to John Coady, Samantha and Nash.

Today, Cape Breton University confers the degree Doctor of Letters, *honoris causa*, on a man who has used his voice not just to sing, but to tell stories that matter, to make people feel seen, to bring comfort and to shine a light on causes close to his heart, Mr. John Gracie.

Ms. Laura Lee Langley

Cape Breton University is delighted to honour and recognize a talented and dedicated public servant who has spent her career promoting and building Nova Scotia's reputation across the country and around the world, Ms. Laura Lee Langley.

Ms. Langley has a wealth of experience in public sector management. Before joining Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency on July 2, 2024, as President, she served for 27 years in the Nova Scotia Public Service, most of that time in the senior ranks. Since 2016, she has served as Deputy Minister of the Office of the Nova Scotia Premier, Deputy Minister of Treasury Board, Clerk of the Executive Council, Nova Scotia Public Service Commissioner, Head of the Nova Scotia Public Service and CEO of Communications Nova Scotia, concurrently. Prior to this, she led various other departments in a Deputy or Associate Deputy Minister role.

She has demonstrated success in engaging employees while working in complex systems, tackling complex problems and driving a whole-of-government, citizen-centred approach to developing public policy. She is interested in transforming how we work in Westminster's model of government while advancing the modernization of public service.

Ms. Langley is a sought-after speaker on leadership, workplace communication and leading in complex systems, and is a certified facilitator in understanding and seeing organizational systems. She has a Master of Public Administration from Dalhousie University (2002) and a Master of Arts in Leadership from Royal Roads University (2015). She joined the Nova Scotia public service after more than 15 years as a journalist, working for both CTV and Global News.

Ms. Langley has served as a board member for various professional and community organizations and is a known advocate for diversity and inclusion. She has been recognized by the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission as a Champion of the Workplace. In 2018, she was recognized as one of Canada's Top 100 Most Powerful Women as a strategic and engaging public-sector leader. In 2024, she received the Public Policy Forum's Frank McKenna Award for her leadership in public service and the King Charles III Coronation Medal. In 2025, she was awarded the Lieutenant Governor's Award for Excellence in Public Administration.

Ms. Langley is from Sydney and currently lives in Oakfield, Nova Scotia, with her family.

Today, Cape Breton University confers the degree Doctor of Letters, *honoris causa*, on a trailblazer for women in leadership and a deep-rooted, life-long commitment to all Nova Scotians, Ms. Laura Lee Langley.

Ms. Nancy Regan

Cape Breton University is delighted to honour and recognize a celebrated television personality and trusted media professional who credits much of her strong sense of community, storytelling and authenticity to her family ties to Cape Breton, Ms. Nancy Regan.

Currently the host of *Showing Up* on Eastlink TV, Nancy started her television career on CTV Atlantic. She built her reputation and profile over 15 years at the helm of *Live at 5*, a highly-rated news magazine that dominated the Maritime television market for the duration of her tenure, averaging a nightly audience of 350,000 viewers.

In this role, Nancy had the opportunity to connect with people from every walk of life on the East Coast of Canada. She also interviewed many of the biggest stars in the entertainment industry, such as Oprah, Madonna and Harrison Ford, to name a few. She served as the national host of *That News Show* and *Good Morning Canada* while it was based on the East Coast.

Nancy began acting while studying English at St. Francis Xavier University, and her passion led to professional roles on stage at Halifax's Neptune Theatre and in many television and film productions such as *Haven*, *The Trailer Park Boys* and *Reversible Errors*.

During the pandemic, Nancy wrote her first book, which became a National Bestseller within two weeks of its release. *From Showing Off to Showing Up* is a disarmingly honest account of a life spent mainly in the spotlight. The subtitle, *An Impostor's Journey from Perfect to Present*, hints at her personal path from carefully concealed insecurity to confidence.

This path has also led to her new TV endeavour, *Showing Up*, in which she joyfully profiles people in our region who are living their lives in dynamic, authentic ways, driven by purpose and passion rather than the expectations of others.

Contribution is a guiding principle in Nancy's life, and over the decades of her career, she has donated her time and talent to countless charitable organizations in Halifax and beyond. She was a long-time co-host of the *Christmas Daddies Telethon* and the *IWK Telethon*. She is the host of *Holiday Magic*, an annual televised fundraiser for Dartmouth General Hospital. She has even gone so far as to step into the ring for a celebrity boxing match, raising money and awareness for Shelter Nova Scotia.

Above all, she is a dedicated mother of three whose family inspires her ongoing growth as a communicator and leader.

Today, Cape Breton University confers the degree Doctor of Letters, *honoris causa*, on an inspirational role model for Maritimers and a true advocate for authenticity and finding your life's purpose, Ms. Nancy Regan.



Convocation Ceremonial Elements



Cape Breton University Coat of Arms

The Cape Breton University Coat of Arms, imprinted on all of our parchments, is a multi-cultural design based on our Mi'kmaw and Celtic heritage. The fox, the eagle and the rich greenery are native to Cape Breton Island and are a reference to the University's beautiful surroundings. The fox is known for its intelligence and indicates the intellectual pursuits involved in acquiring a degree. It is a reference to the University's founder, Dr. Donald F. Campbell, known as the "silver fox." The eagle represents intelligence and idealism. It also honours the unique connections between Cape Breton University and the Mi'kmaw community.

The Canterbury Cap is symbolic of higher learning. The mayflowers are the floral emblem of Nova Scotia.

THEID DÌCHIOILL AIR THOISEACH: This is a Gaelic phrase meaning "Perseverance will Triumph."

The Cape Breton sloop is taken from the Great Seal of the Colony of Cape Breton (1784-1820) and honours the University's location. The wavy bands of blue and white suggest the ocean and the Bras d'Or Lake. The spruce boughs honour the First Nations who were the first inhabitants of the Island, and the maple leaf refers to Canada. The keys and the open book allude to the idea of unlocking knowledge.



Valedictorian

CBU has a longstanding tradition of electing a high-achieving student who embodies CBU's Graduate Attributes and has made significant contributions to the CBU community during their studies as the valedictorian. This distinguished individual will deliver the valedictory address at the CBU Convocation ceremony. In this address, they will reflect on their educational journey, instill hope for the future and express gratitude to all those who supported them along the way. Derived from the Latin phrase meaning "to bid farewell," the term valedictorian encapsulates a unique opportunity to represent, inspire and bid farewell to one's graduating class.

The valedictorian also holds the important responsibility of carrying the CBU Mace during the Convocation Ceremony procession. As both Valedictorian and Mace Bearer, this student will join the procession alongside the members of the stage party at the CBU Convocation and sit on the stage during the Convocation ceremony.

Cape Breton University Mace, Chain of Office and Chairs

The Mace, given by Mr. and Mrs. Irving Schwartz in memory of Mrs. Rose Schwartz, was designed and created by Cape Breton's own jeweller and craftsman, Darryl MacLeod. The shaft of the Mace is formed by a portion of an oak window from Moxham's Castle. The top of the ornate crown is adorned with four diamonds donated by Dr. Robert Morgan in memory of his wife, Barbara, who died in 1993.

The President's Chain of Office, also designed and created by Mr. MacLeod, speaks boldly of Cape Breton University and Cape Breton. The Chain was commissioned in honour of Cape Breton University's twentieth anniversary and was donated by the partners and staff of Deloitte & Touche in honour of Mr. James W. Miller, former managing partner.

Silver thistles and gold fiddles join the Chain. The Chain also has a silver fleur de lis, a replica of a coin from the "Chameau" treasure, and a silver medallion of the Cross and Crescent of the Mi'kmaw flag. CBU's Coat of Arms shares the focal point with the Great Seal of Cape Breton. The Chain is designed to represent our ties with the French and Mi'kmaw cultures, as well as our strong Celtic ties with the Scottish, Irish and Breton settlers.

Cape Breton's best known furniture maker, Leo MacNeil, crafted two chairs for our Institution. The larger of the two chairs is used by the Chancellor during convocation ceremonies. The back of the chair has the Cape Breton University Coat of Arms hand engraved and painted. The second chair is used by the President. Both chairs have been constructed from Cape Breton oak, with green velvet seats to complement the University's colours and the green of Cape Breton.
